

Ovid's Life

Ovid was born in Sulmo, a small town in central Italy, in 43 BC. His family was wealthy and well-connected, and he received a privileged education in Rome. 

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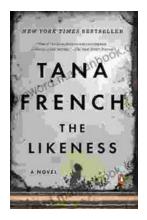


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
